## Mike Figgis: Kate & Other Women

Whether you're genuinely interested in exquisitely composed photography or you're just looking for an excuse to gaze longingly at Kate Moss, this new exhibition offers something for everyone. British filmmaker Mike Figgis is best known as the director of grim-but-excellent 1995 drama *Leaving Las Vegas*, but 'Kate & Other Women' proves he's just as handy with a stills camera as he is with a clapperboard. His evocative shots of Ms Moss were originally taken for an Agent Provocateur advertising campaign in 2007, but Figgis has since enhanced them via experimentation with different textures and formats. Also on display are some equally stunning photos of one-time Bond girl Eva Green (pictured).
